Make Room for Change

Change is inevitable. Every four years we choose the leaders of our federal government. Here in Western NY we get the privilege of witnessing the changing of four seasons. Every September we watch little children ride the school bus for the first time and we understand their lives are now embarking on major life changes. Libraries change too. We are living institutions that must keep current with our culture, our community and our patrons' needs.

To that end the staff have been working hard on a major weeding process that is recommended to be done every 8-10 years. We use our data bases to run reports that show what items in our collection that were published before 2013 and have had no checkouts since then. The next step is we narrow that criteria down to the specific collection type, such as Junior Paperbacks. We run our report and we are armed with spreadsheets that we use to go searching for those items. These last few months we have worked our way thru the Adult Hardcover Fiction, Junior Series Chapter books, Junior paperbacks and some children's small chapter books. By the time you read this we hope to have the weeding of the Adult Nonfiction section finished. While we take stock of what books go and what books stay we also need to be cognizant of the kind of book it is. We will not pull off our shelves books by classic poets or any kind of classic literature even if it has had limited checkouts. There should always be room in a library collection for the classics of literature. The others will get taken off our shelves and deleted out of our collection data base. I have to admit it is a little hard to actually do that if you are one who absolutely loves books. It's difficult to say goodbye to a personal favorite author because their writing no longer attracts readers.

The weeding is also done to give us an understanding of what kind of books and authors our patrons are actually currently interested in. In the past we may have automatically ordered books from a certain author because they were popular at the time. By analyzing the circulation data we might realize that nobody has been interested in those books or that particular author for quite a few years. We are a small library with limited space to hold our collections. There are so many new books and debut authors that our patrons would like to read and we need to make sure there is room on our shelves for them.

Our shelves may be looking a little sparser right now. Don't be concerned. Look at them instead with anticipation of all the new books you'll be able to enjoy!

ADULT NONFICTION: FINDING MEANING: THE SIXTH STAGE OF GRIEF by David Kessler Hardcover, 257 pages, published November 5th 2019 by Scribner

In this groundbreaking new work, David Kessler—an expert on grief and the coauthor with Elisabeth Kübler-Ross of the iconic On Grief and Grieving—journeys beyond the classic five stages to discover a sixth stage: meaning.

In 1969, Elisabeth Kübler Ross first identified the stages of dying in her transformative book On Death and Dying. Decades later, she and David Kessler wrote the classic On Grief and Grieving, introducing the stages of grief with the same transformative pragmatism and compassion. Now, based on hard-earned personal experiences, as well as knowledge and wisdom earned through decades of work with the grieving, Kessler introduces a critical sixth stage.

Many people look for "closure" after a loss. Kessler argues that it's finding meaning beyond the stages of grief most of us are familiar with—denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance—that can transform grief into a more peaceful and hopeful experience.

In this book, Kessler gives readers a roadmap to remembering those who have died with more love than pain; he shows us how to move forward in a way that honors our loved ones. Kessler's insight is both professional and intensely personal. His journey with grief began when, as a child, he witnessed a mass shooting at the same time his mother was dying. For most of his life, Kessler taught physicians, nurses, counselors, police, and first responders about end of life, trauma, and grief, as well as leading talks and retreats for those experiencing grief. Despite his knowledge, his life was upended by the sudden death of his twenty-one-year-old son.

How does the grief expert handle such a tragic loss? He knew he had to find a way through this unexpected, devastating loss, a way that would honor his son. That, ultimately, was the sixth state of grief—meaning. In Finding Meaning, Kessler shares the insights, collective wisdom, and powerful tools that will help those experiencing loss.

Finding Meaning is a necessary addition to grief literature and a vital guide to healing from tremendous loss. This is an inspiring, deeply intelligent must-read for anyone looking to journey away from suffering, through loss, and towards meaning.

ADULT FICTION: Do Not Go On by Bryan Furuness

Paperback 244 pages, published November 2019 by Black Lawrence Press

The witness protection program is supposed to be a fresh start, but for the newly inducted Easterday family, it's more like a personal apocalypse. The mother refuses to leave their home in Baltimore, the father sinks into paranoia, and seventeen-year-old Ana gets stuck caring for him in the forsaken town of Morocco, Indiana, wondering if she's lost her future as well as her past. When a former hitman named Zeeshan offers them a way to come back home, Ana has to determine whether she would get her life back or lose it entirely. Over the course of a few months, she'll make her way through an underground world of reformed gangsters, hungry politicians, and teenagers smuggled in from the villages of Kashmir, all of them trying to find the line between secret and identity.

DO NOT GO ON is a story about secrets, second chances, and the ways that storytelling can save your skin and soul. In this book that is part crime confessional, part coming-of-age tale, the Witness Protection Program and college application process are two different ways of getting at the same question: Who are you, and who will you become?


