Meet You Under the Tent?

Just like some of you I have been spending a lot of time in webinars and Zoom meetings. Some folks may be tired of them but I've found them to be very useful. I've been able to connect better online with many directors within the Chautauqua Cattaraugus Library System as well as meet new directors from across the state. It's been very encouraging to hear all the creative ways libraries are trying to provide for their patrons and communities in this pandemic time period.

Even though we are technically a "small" sized library we are blessed to have a community room large enough for us to be able to satisfy the 6 ft. social distancing policy. This allows us to host small programs that can have 10 attendees. Plans are in progress to host an in-person Summer Reading Program. I'm booking presenters and scheduling craft programs for every Wednesday starting July 7th. More information will be in the June newsletter. As a backup to indoor programming we are planning on purchasing a large, perhaps 10x20ft tent we can set up in the lawn in back of our library. This can be used in many ways but will importantly help us to be able to run programs outside in case pandemic protocols change in the next few months.

We have some small groups that are already meeting safely in our community room; Wednesday Yoga has around 5 regular attendees, book club is running around 7 and the sewing/craft group so far has 4 people coming. An addition in our May schedule is "History Movies at the Library". This will be a series of free movies presented on the first Thursday of the month starting May 6th. These are documentaries produced by American Experience Productions and have been shown on Public Broadcasting stations such as the Smithsonian channel. With varied topics such as "Building the Alaskan Highway", "The Dust Bowl", "The Pilgrims" and more, we think patrons will find the topics interesting and entertaining. Registration is required as seating is limited to ten. The full schedule can be seen on page two.

I have learned through the zoom director meetings that a lot of libraries are offering the Activity Bags as an alternative to in-person programming. We have had success with the Grab-N-Go Activity bags also. In April we gave away 23 Spring bags with flower seeds, soil and a small jar for planting. We plan to continue to provide these themed craft bags as they give children and their families an activity they can do at home.

I want to thank everyone who has come into the library for the great attitudes you have shown. We have had no real problem with patrons abiding by the pandemic policies in place. We are still practicing mask wearing, social distancing and sanitizing of the library but we are open our full hours and are here to welcome you back. If you are not comfortable enough yet to enter the library we gladly provide curbside pickup for those who desire it. Please call with your requested items and we'll set up a day/time for you to drive by and pick them up.

We are determined to keep connecting with friends and the community. Maybe soon we can all meet outside under the tent for a Saturday breakfast?

Book Highlights of the Month

ADULT FICTION: Godshot: A Novel by Chelsea Bieker

Drought has settled on the town of Peaches, California. The area of the Central Valley where fourteen-yearold Lacey May and her alcoholic mother live was once an agricultural paradise. Now it's an environmental disaster, a place of cracked earth and barren raisin farms. In their desperation, residents have turned to a cult leader named Pastor Vern for guidance. He promises, through secret "assignments," to bring the rain everybody is praying for.

Lacey has no reason to doubt the pastor. But then her life explodes in a single unimaginable act of abandonment: her mother, exiled from the community for her sins, leaves Lacey and runs off with a man she barely knows. Abandoned and distraught, Lacey May moves in with her widowed grandma, Cherry, who is more concerned with her taxidermy mice collection than her own granddaughter. As Lacey May endures the increasingly appalling acts of men who want to write all the rules, and begins to uncover the full extent of Pastor Vern's shocking plan to bring fertility back to the land, she decides she must go on a quest to find her mother, no matter what it takes. With her only guidance coming from the romance novels she reads and the unlikely companionship of the women who knew her mother, she must find her own way through unthinkable circumstances.

Possessed of an unstoppable plot and a brilliantly soulful voice, **Godshot** is a book of grit and humor and heart, a debut novel about female friendship and resilience, mother-loss and motherhood, and seeking salvation in unexpected places. It introduces a writer who gives Flannery O'Connor's Gothic parables a Californian twist and who emerges with a miracle that is all her own.

ADULT NON FICTION: KNOW YOURSELF, KNOW YOUR MONEY Rachel Cruze, Dave Ramsey (Contributor)

Rachel Cruze, the daughter of money guru Dave Ramsey, knows that how you spend, or save, money isn't just about budgeting or the size of your salary. In **Know Yourself, Know Your Money**, she gets real about why people think, use, and react to money in the ways that they do.

This book is about much more than just handling money in a better way. It's about digging deep into money lessons, perceptions, and the stories that people learn about money growing up, and showing how these affect spending habits into adulthood. With a conversational, humorous tone and plenty of personal stories, Cruze also discusses how growing up with Dave Ramsey, and later working at Ramsey Solutions, has affected her own monetary mindset.

Throughout, Cruze names some common categories that people fall into when it comes to money: some people are spenders, others are savers; some are spontaneous about giving money, others plan their monetary gifts out. Those raised in families wherein money is never talked about, or where there's never enough money, may grow up anxious about finances, Cruze shows, and even uncomfortable with spending money as adults.

Its language clear, the book reveals how personal motivations to spend or save are formed based on early experiences. Its about demystifying lessons that reveal common misconceptions about why people treat money the ways that they do. Most illuminating is an explanation of how money clashes happen between couples: most often, Cruze shows, such issues are rooted in individuals' differing early lessons about money. Cruze suggests ways of resolving such issues, resulting in a compassionate personal finance text that makes lasting change seem possible. **Know Yourself, Know Your Money** is an insightful text that encourages understanding how early lessons impact lifelong personal relationships with money.

"Behind Every Great Community is a great Library!" That's our 2021 GiveBig CHQ theme one day online giving event that is happening on June 10th. Perhaps you have donated to our library in the past or you are a person who cares deeply about small libraries and the value they bring to rural communities.

Ellington Farman Library responded to the pandemic with curbside pickup, contact-less deliveries and a porch full of books and DVD's that we offered for free. Social media, our website and printed newsletters helped us stay connected to our patrons. It was a great time to revaluate exactly how our patrons used our library resources. What we learned has given rise to our GiveBig CHQ theme.

Who wants to be number 82 on a wait list for the latest Pulitzer prize winning book? Our library designates a yearly amount to be given to the Chautauqua Cattaraugus Library System so they can purchase digital overdrive books and magazine titles that our patrons can download on their devices thru the Libby App. *Our annual donation has not increased in a number of years although the pandemic showed us we have more digital patrons than ever before!* This year we would like to be able to have more purchasing power and provide digital patrons with more titles to choose from, resulting in less wait time. Our digital patrons are sometimes invisible in our library but they deserve to have books available to them just as much as the patron who walks in our doors. Your donation this year will alleviate some of the long hold times and provide an extended selection of titles to our digital patrons.

There are some item collections that are more expensive to purchase than others. Large print and Books on CD (Audio Books) are two of them. Their expense results in our library being unable to buy the latest novels because we wait for sales on older titles. There were patrons who were homebound during the pandemic who had already read every title we had available in our large print and Book -on- CD collection. We see the need for more items in these two collections but our budget can only stretch so far. Your contribution on June 10th provides updated titles to these patrons.

No Summer Craft & Reading Programs during the pandemic? No problem as our library provided over 80 complete craft activity bags last summer as an alternative to in person programming. These bags provided creativity and intergenerational bonding as we saw the children working together with other family members in the Town Park across the street from the library. We provided all the supplies and instructions in each bag along with themed book suggestions. Families loved these "Take a Bag-Take a Book" activities so much that they requested we provide them throughout this year. You can help families with creative and educational activities they can do together at home with your donation to our children's craft bag program.

Ellington Farman Library is participating in the GiveBig CHQ which is an online fundraiser hosted by The Chautauqua Region Community Foundation specifically to help nonprofits raise funds.
