Yummy cooking demonstrations with children in the "Cooking with Allison" monthly group were always an adventure with new foods that we haven't had in a while. Music will be heard wafting through a summer evening as the Town brings back the Music in the Park series.

Our library is adhering to NYS Health requirements and as such, social distancing is no longer required inside the library. Unvaccinated patrons and those under age 12 still need to wear masks to enter. Those who are vaccinated may use the library unmasked. Free masks are available, and you are welcome to wear them according to your comfort level. Please make use of our hand sanitizer. Room capacity limits have been lifted and programming may continue indoors. If NYS or county health mandates change we will keep you updated.

WHAT IS THE DELAY IN NEW BOOKS?

We are experiencing quite a delay in book deliveries the past 6 months. Our library has 39 standing authors whose books get delivered on an automatic basis whenever that author publishes a new book. We are given the publishing date and in a perfect world we should be receiving those books the week of the published date or even a week before. It seems we are instead receiving them a month or two later than the published date. There is a wide discrepancy in which libraries are receiving their books on time. CCLS has been working with our publishing houses to get to the reason behind this. This was the answer they were given: "There are still supply chain issues with printers, publishers, etc., which continue to slow release and delivery of some titles. The other main problems involve: 1) B&T warehouses, which had to be redesigned to keep workers farther apart, which tends to slow their workflow; and 2) there are large numbers of recently-hired warehouse workers, who don't have experience enough to fill orders as quickly as in, say, 2019. All this has led to a substantial backlog in orders, which B&T is working to shrink through weekend shifts and mandatory overtime."

Please be patient and know those books by your favorite authors will be coming eventually as they have been ordered. We're bothered by the delay as much as you are. Unfortunately holds cannot be placed on brand new books so we might also not be able to get them for you from other libraries. We can tell you what library has them and you can physically go to another library and check them out yourself.

Book Highlights of the Month

<u>ADULT FICTION</u>: Hour of the Witch by Chris Bohjalian (on order, coming soon) A solid historical novel of this time period, where women who refused to conform were often labeled witches.

A young Puritan woman–faithful, resourceful, but afraid of the demons that dog her soul–plots her escape from a violent marriage in this riveting and propulsive historical thriller from the #1 New York Times bestselling author of The Flight Attendant.

Boston, 1662. Mary Deerfield is twenty-four-years-old. Her skin is porcelain, her eyes delft blue, and in England she might have had many suitors. But here in the New World, amid this community of saints, Mary is the second wife of Thomas Deerfield, a man as cruel as he is powerful. When Thomas, prone to drunken rage, drives a three-tined fork into the back of Mary's hand, she resolves that she must divorce him to save her life. But in a world where every neighbor is watching for signs of the devil, a woman like Mary–a woman who harbors secret desires and finds it difficult to tolerate the brazen hypocrisy of so many men in the colony–soon finds herself the object of suspicion and rumor. When tainted objects are discovered buried in Mary's garden, when a boy she has treated with herbs and simples dies, and when their servant girl runs screaming in fright from her home, Mary must fight to not only escape her marriage, but also the gallows. A twisting, tightly plotted thriller from one of our greatest storytellers, Hour of the Witch is a timely and terrifying novel of socially sanctioned brutality and the original American witch hunt.

<u>ADULT NON FICTION</u>: Tiger in the Sea: The Ditching of Flying Tiger 923 and the Desperate Struggle for Survival by Eric Lindner (*on order, coming soon*)

September 1962: On a moonless night over the raging Atlantic Ocean, a thousand miles from land, the engines of Flying Tiger flight 923 to Germany burst into flames, one by one.

Pilot John Murray didn't have long before the plane crashed headlong into the 20-foot waves at 120 mph. As the four flight attendants donned life vests, collected sharp objects, and explained how to brace for the ferocious impact, 68 passengers clung to their seats: elementary schoolchildren from Hawaii, a teenage newlywed from Germany, a disabled Normandy vet from Cape Cod, an immigrant from Mexico, and 30 recent graduates of the 82nd Airborne's Jump School. They all expected to die.

Murray radioed out "Mayday" as he attempted to fly down through gale-force winds into the rough water, hoping the plane didn't break apart when it hit the sea.

Only a handful of ships could pick up the distress call so far from land. The closest was a Swiss freighter 13 hours away. Dozens of other ships and planes from nine countries abruptly changed course or scrambled from Canada, Iceland, Ireland, Scotland, and Cornwall, all racing to the rescue–but they would take hours, or days, to arrive.

From the cockpit, the blackness of the Atlantic grew ever closer. Could Murray do what no pilot had ever done–"land" a commercial airliner at night in a violent sea without everyone dying? And if he did, would rescuers find any survivors before they drowned or died from hypothermia in the icy water?

The fate of Flying Tiger 923 riveted the world. Bulletins interrupted radio and TV programs. Headlines shouted off newspapers from London to LA. Frantic family members overwhelmed telephone switchboards. President Kennedy took a break from the brewing crises in Cuba and Mississippi to ask for hourly updates.

Tiger in the Sea is a gripping tale of triumph, tragedy, unparalleled airmanship, and incredibly brave people from all walks of life. The author has pieced together the story–long hidden because of murky Cold War politics–through exhaustive research and reconstructed a true and inspiring tribute to the virtues of outside-the-box-thinking, teamwork, and hope.

Your donations even helped us qualify for a special award in the amount of \$574.60. That brings the total Give Big CHQ funds to \$3,272.60!



We had patrons saving their returnable cans and plastic bottles for us and they donated them to our library for a "Returnable Fundraiser" that took in \$409.


Every year we are grateful beyond words to the folks who donate to keep this library going. They obviously care about small, rural libraries and want to help us bring value to this community.

8 WAYS TO PREVENT TWEENS FROM BACKSLIDING THIS SUMMER by Melissa Taylor

Two and a half months of vacation equals two and a half months of no learning. And sometimes that equals two and a half months of backsliding, also called summer learning loss.

But there's good news. You can prevent this dreaded summer learning loss by keeping your kids' brains engaged throughout the summer. Here's how:

1. Read

If an apple a day can keep the doctor away, a book a week keeps the brain at its peak. (Clearly I wasn't hired for my rhymes ... but you get the gist.) Reading keeps your comprehension skills up to par. But make daily reading fun, not grueling. Participate in a summer reading program. Let your child choose the books they want to read. Let them stay up late to read in bed with a headlamp. Read and review books on <u>Bookopolis</u>. For more creative reading activities, visit my <u>Reading Activities board</u> on Pinterest.

2. Take Field Trips

Museums, nature centers, and historic sites build a child's background knowledge and vocabulary. If this isn't an option, you can always go on a <u>virtual field trip</u>.

3. Play Games

Most games help kids practice social skills and problem solving, both good things to keep sharp over the summer. Try playing strategy and thinking games like <u>Scrambled States of America</u>, <u>WordARound</u>, <u>Swish</u>, <u>FlipOut</u>, or <u>Zeus on the Loose</u>.

4. Shop

Let your kids spend their allowance. And encourage them to help you pay for things when you're out shopping. This gives them practice adding up costs as well as counting money, important math and life skills.

5. Write

Since kids love technology, get your kids writing with their own <u>private blog</u>. Suggest writing reviews about movies, games, or books to share with their friends and family members. Make writing social. Kids will have fun writing a shared story with their friends via <u>email or Google Docs</u>.

6. Make Math Fun

It's true that kids lose their math facts without practice. (I occasionally have to review my 8s now and again, too.) Certainly there's always flashcards, but don't forget multiplication and division apps. See what you think about these fun choices: <u>Sushi Monster</u>, <u>Mathmateer</u>, and <u>Squeebles</u>.

7. Go to Camp


Attend a camp. Even better, attend a camp that encourages developing new skills. Reinforce the camp's learning with discussion and activities at home.

8. Try DIY with Pinterest

It's not just adults who are addicted to Pinterest; kids love it, too. Help your kids use Pinterest to find DIY activities to try — whether arts and crafts or home décor. They'll be reading, following directions, problem solving, and best of all, creating. Follow <u>Make Magazine</u>, <u>Instructables</u> and <u>Babble</u> <u>Dabble Do</u> for lots of DIY ideas.

Of course, it still is summer so be flexible and don't forget to play. As Fred Rogers famously said, "Play is really the work of childhood." Have a great summer!
