book by Mike Lupica... what do they have in common? They are all

specifically marketed as "boy books" or girl books". ESPN personality and sports writer Mike Lupica's books happen to be about youth sports teams and the boys who play on them. They almost always feature male protagonists. In other words it is a boy who drives the story and the other boys on his team are his backup characters. Lupica's themes also have some great team building morals and situations where youth's decisions have real world positive consequences. Another item to note; his cover illustrations are always boys. For those reasons publishers, teachers, parents and librarians tend to recommend his books to boys. Adults assume that books with male main characters would only be interesting to boys. We cut girls off from reading some great books about sports even though girls play on sports teams all the time.

The Babysitter's Club series tends to feature girls on the cover. The themes in these books involve emotions and how youth, usually girls, navigate social situations. This series is always recommended to girls. Why do we do that? This only serves to reinforce the idea that boys should not be interested in how girls think or react. It also sends a message that girls and their situations are, in general, less interesting to read about.

When we search for an interesting book to read aloud to a preschool boy are we constantly searching for a book with a car, tractor, or a picture of a male character on the front? No. A child that age is usually not interested in the gender of that fluffy little duck on the front cover. To be fair, we should look for books that are of interest to our children. I have a son, who as a preschooler, went through a phase where he was only interested in having me read books that had trucks on the cover. He was interested in construction trucks and that's what we read a lot of. I personally preferred to read aloud the "Alfie and Annie Rose" series by author Shirley Hughes but they didn't feature front end loaders on the cover so the John Deere series books were well worn in our family. Interestingly he never asked if that truck was a girl or a boy truck.

Let's try to have an open mind when we recommend books to our children. Let them read stories that make them think, make them wonder and open doors to all kinds of worlds.

By targeting books to only one gender we take away the opportunity for children to see the world through another lens. Our children learn another's point of view when they read about it. Books bring us into the mind of the character as we learn the how and the why of their responses to life experiences. Even the books that don't have in-depth character development still introduce exciting situations and problems that the main protagonist must solve. Should it really matter whether that character is a boy or a girl?

BOOK REVIEW:

There is a book for everything. Somewhere in the vast Library of the Universe, as Natalie thought of it, there was a book that embodied exactly the things she was worrying about. In the wake of a shocking tragedy, Natalie Harper inherits her mother's charming but financially strapped bookshop in San Francisco. She also becomes caretaker for her ailing grandfather Andrew, her only living relative—not counting her scoundrel father.

But the gruff, deeply kind Andrew has begun displaying signs of decline. Natalie thinks it's best to move him to an assisted living facility to ensure the care he needs. To pay for it, she plans to close the bookstore and sell the derelict but valuable building on historic Perdita Street, which is in need of constant fixing. There's only one problem–Grandpa Andrew owns the building and refuses to sell. Natalie adores her grandfather; she'll do whatever it takes to make his final years happy. Besides, she loves the store and its books provide welcome solace for her overwhelming grief.

After she moves into the small studio apartment above the shop, Natalie carries out her grandfather's request and hires contractor Peach Gallagher to do the necessary and ongoing repairs. His young daughter, Dorothy, also becomes a regular at the store, and she and Natalie begin reading together while Peach works.

To Natalie's surprise, her sorrow begins to dissipate as her life becomes an unexpected journey of new connections, discoveries and revelations, from unearthing artifacts hidden in the bookshop's walls, to discovering the truth about her family, her future, and her own heart.







HOME ALONE SAFETY COURSE

The Library will be hosting a free Home Alone Safety class for youth in grades 3-8th on Wednesday July 20th from 11am—12:30pm. This is a great course taught by experienced leaders from the Chautauqua Safety Village. They highly recommend you have your child attend as it's very informative and will

provide parents peace of mind as they leave their children home alone, especially in the summer months. Below is a description of what participants will be learning.

The students will explore four topics that comprise the home alone safety plan: kitchen, fire, first aid and personal safety. They will develop an awareness of dangers in the kitchen, they will learn how to respond



if there is a fire in their home, they will learn basic first aid procedures, understand what it means to be safe, and understand the importance of decision-making and how it effects their safety.

- The students will learn to;
- Recognize and verbalize the potential dangers in their kitchen.
- Visually identify items that can get hot and can start fires.
- Understand how to check a door to see if it is hot.
- Understand how to use an escape ladder.
- Understand the importance of knowing two ways out of every room.
- Understand the importance of not returning to a burning building.
- Observe a mock 911 call.
- Observe and understand appropriate first aid treatment for basic medical emergencies.
- Practice decision-making skills.
- Recognize and identify unsafe situations.
- Understand and develop internet safety guidelines.
- Develop a personal safety plan.


book! The book is Illustrated by Caitlyn Livermore and is available to purchase from the author and on Amazon.

BABYSITTING CERTIFICATION COURSE WEDNESDAY JULY 6; 9:30am- 2pm

The Library, in partnership with the Chautauqua Safety Village, will be providing a Babysitter Certification course on Wednesday July 6th from 9:30am—2pm. This hands-on lesson is designed for youth ages 10 through 16. Participants will learn how to care for infants and young children, communicate effectively with children and their parents, offer age appropriate games, meals, and snacks, recognize safety issues and learn how to respond in an emergency. At the end of class, each student will receive their own babysitting bag. This course is an important step in preparing older youth to be in charge of their younger siblings. Upon completion of the course, students will receive a two year certification from the American Heart Association (for youth 12 and older) and will be trained in choking relief and basic first aid. Participation in this course should help youth find babysitting jobs by showing future clients they are well qualified for the job.

Objectives:

- **1**. Learn and demonstrate the proper CPR technique for adults and infants.
- 2. Learn and demonstrate the proper choking relief for adults and infants.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to prepare child-friendly meals and snacks.
- 4. Learn and practice basic first aid techniques.
- 5. Demonstrate how to properly care for an infant.
- 6. Discuss behavior and discipline techniques.
