LET THEM SEE YOU READING

I preface this with saying that I am obviously biased when I make the statement that libraries and reading, in general, are important. I find that reading fiction can be particularly important. Fiction has important values. It acts like a gateway drug to reading.

A well written work of fiction makes you want to know what happens next. It implores you to turn the page, stay up late to find out what happens to the characters and situations they find themselves in. You have the need to know how it all ends and that's a common emotion. A science fiction or fantasy novel may force you to learn new words and even new worlds that those words are being used in. Fiction will take you to places you have never been or even imagined going to.

When you watch TV or see a film, you are pretty much a spectator watching things happen to other people. It's all spelled out for you in a visual medium and though it may affect you in the moment it doesn't engage your imagination as much as reading can. You can watch a whole television show and unless you go back and rewatch it again and again it might not have made an impression on you. When it ends it's over and the next show starts. How many times does anyone ever pause a show and think about ways the character could have responded differently?

A book lets you read a few chapters and then, if you can, put the book down and dwell on what you just read. You can have an image of what you think the characters look and sound like and that image can be entirely different than another readers idea. As you read do you sometimes verbalize the distinctions in conversations according to each character's personality? Some may not but I do. If it is a good novel and I'm engrossed in it I hear their voices and the cadence of speech.

The act of reading fiction lets you visit situations that you might not otherwise know about and learn how the characters navigate their circumstances. They may react quite differently than you would and it creates empathy when you begin to understand their plight. Fiction can show you a different world. It can take you to places and time periods you have never been and perhaps give you glimpses of the future.

I believe we should read for pleasure and let others see us reading. We need to exercise our imaginations just as a child does and reading fiction can help us stay in that open minded mode. We also can be an example by showing others that reading is a good thing. Children do emulate what they see at home and if adults are reading there is a good chance that the children will be also. It is our obligation to the next generation, our future, that we engage them in ideas through books, that we keep their imaginative minds open to new possibilities through reading. Novels of fiction do an excellent job of that. We, as readers and lovers of libraries, need to promote books and encourage people to support the libraries that offer them free to all.

BOOK REVIEW: The Dutch House by Ann Patchett Goodreads Choice Award Nominee for Best Historical Fiction (2019)

At the end of the Second World War, Cyril Conroy combines luck and a single canny investment to begin an enormous real estate empire, propelling his family from poverty to enormous wealth. His first order of business is to buy the Dutch House, a lavish estate in the suburbs outside of Philadelphia. Meant as a surprise for his wife, the house sets in motion the undoing of everyone he loves.

The story is told by Cyril's son Danny, as he and his older sister, the brilliantly acerbic and self-assured Maeve, are exiled from the house where they grew up by their stepmother. The two wealthy siblings are thrown back into the poverty their parents had escaped from and find that all they have to count on is one another. It is this unshakable bond between them that both saves their lives and thwarts their futures.

Set over the course of five decades, The Dutch House is a dark fairy tale about two smart people who cannot overcome their past. Despite every outward sign of success, Danny and Maeve are only truly comfortable when they're together. Throughout their lives, they return to the well-worn story of what they've lost with humor and rage. But when at last they're forced to confront the people who left them behind, the relationship between an indulged brother and his ever-protective sister is finally tested.

ADULT FICTION: A PLACE TO LAND by Lauren K. Denton

Historical Fiction

A hidden past isn't past at all.

Violet Figg and her sister Trudy have lived a quiet life in Sugar Bend ever since a night forty years ago stole Trudy's voice and cemented Violet's role as Trudy's fierce and loyal protector. Now, Trudy spends her days making sculptures from found objects and speaking via notes written on scraps of paper, while Violet runs their art shop, monitors the bird activity up and down the water, and tries not to think of her one great love she gave up in order to keep her sister safe.

Eighteen-year-old Maya knows where everyone else belongs, but she's been searching for her own place ever since her grandmother died seven years ago. Moving in and out of strangers' houses has left her exhausted, so when she sees a flyer on a gas station window for a place called Sugar Bend, she follows the strange pull she feels and finds herself on the doorstep of an art shop called Two Sisters.

When a boat rises to the surface of Little River in the middle of the night, the present and the no-longer-buried past clash, and the future is at stake for Maya, Violet, and Trudy. As history creeps continually closer to the present and old secrets come to light, the sisters must decide if it's time to face the truth of what happened forty years ago, or risk losing each other and newly formed bonds with those they've come to love.

<u>ADULT NON FICTION:</u> A FEVER IN THE HEARTLAND: The Ku Klux Klan's Plot to

Take Over America, and the Woman Who Stopped Them by Timothy Egan

A FEVER IN THE HEARTLAND marries a propulsive drama to a powerful and page-turning reckoning with one of the darkest threads in American history.

A historical thriller by the Pulitzer and National Book Award-winning author that tells the riveting story of the Klan's rise to power in the 1920s, the cunning con man who drove that rise, and the woman who stopped them.

The Roaring Twenties—the Jazz Age—has been characterized as a time of Gatsby frivolity. But it was also the height of the uniquely American hate group, the Ku Klux Klan. Their domain was not the old Confederacy, but the Heartland and the West. They hated Blacks, Jews, Catholics and immigrants in equal measure, and took radical steps to keep these people from the American promise. And the man who set in motion their takeover of great swaths of America was a charismatic charlatan named D.C. Stephenson.

Stephenson was a magnetic presence whose life story changed with every telling. Within two years of his arrival in Indiana, he'd become the Grand Dragon of the state and the architect of the strategy that brought the group out of the shadows – their message endorsed from the pulpits of local churches, spread at family picnics and town celebrations. Judges, prosecutors, ministers, governors and senators across the country all proudly proclaimed their membership. But at the peak of his influence, it was a seemingly powerless woman – Madge Oberholtzer – who would reveal his secret cruelties, and whose deathbed testimony finally brought the Klan to their knees.

GOOD SKILLS CAREER INFORMATION EVENT

The Good Skills Builder Program will be offering an informational drop in event at our library on Tuesday May 23rd from 5-7pm. There will be an informational table set up for you to speak with representatives and gather details on this program and how to apply for it. The Good Skills Career Builder Program is affiliated with Goodwill of WNY. The program is for those who are over the age of 18, with a high school diploma or GED, and are looking for fulltime work in the manufacturing field. The courses are available at the Jamestown Community College Campus. The program is completely free and they offer a 500 dollar stipend upon completion of the program. Individuals in the program would receive fork-

ADVENTURE DAY PASSES AVAILABLE AT YOUR OCAL LIBRARY!

Each library has passes your family can checkout to discover local attractions. These passes are meant to be used once by families to discover some of the great museums and similar organizations! Check with any library staff to see what passes are available and any guidelines for the organization. At this time we have the following passes available and more may be coming soon.

Use of the Day Adventure Pass is intended to serve as an introduction to each destination. The passes are not intended for repeated use by the same individual or family. Each pass provides free admission to the destination—some restrictions may apply.

PASS BORROWING RULES

- Borrowers must be 18 years of age or older, a current CCLS library cardholder in good standing, and provide valid identification or library card at check-out.
- The loan period for the pass is for seven calendar days (no renewal allowed).
- Patrons must return the pass to the checkout library no later than 11:59 p.m. on the seventh day. The pass must be returned to the outdoor book drop if the library is closed. If the library is open, the pass must be returned to the circulation desk.
- Patrons must take these passes out on their own library card only.
- · Patrons may check out only one pass at a time.

LATE AND OVERDUE FEES

A late fee of \$2 per day will be charged for passes not returned on time, up to 5 days or \$10.
