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

THE BROKEN GIRLS Book Review Genres: Mystery, Thriller, Fiction, Historical Fiction Nominee for Best Mystery & Thriller (2018)

A suspense novel from the award-winning author of The Haunting of Maddy Clare...

Vermont, 1950. There's a place for the girls whom no one wants—the troublemakers, the illegitimate, the too smart for their own good. It's called Idlewild Hall. And in the small town where it's located, there are rumors that the boarding school is haunted. Four roommates bond over their whispered fears, their budding friendship blossoming—until one of them mysteriously disappears. . . .

Vermont, 2014. As much as she's tried, journalist Fiona Sheridan cannot stop revisiting the events surrounding her older sister's death. Twenty years ago, her body was found lying in the overgrown fields near the ruins of Idlewild Hall. And though her sister's boyfriend was tried and convicted of murder, Fiona can't shake the suspicion that something was never right about the case.

When Fiona discovers that Idlewild Hall is being restored by an anonymous benefactor, she decides to write a story about it. But a shocking discovery during the renovations will link the loss of her sister to secrets that were meant to stay hidden in the past—and a voice that won't be silenced. . . .

Book Highlights of the Month

ADULT FICTION: AGAIN AND AGAIN by Jonathan Evison

Genres; HISTORICAL FICTION | FAMILY LIFE & FRIENDSHIP | GENERAL FICTION From one of America's greatest, most creative novelists comes Again and Again , a poignant and endlessly surprising story about love lost, found, and redeemed

An elderly man looks back on his life—or is it lives? Eugene Miles, the narrator of Evison's eighth novel, is about to turn either 106 years old or a thousand and change. Living in an eldercare facility, he regales one of its housekeepers, Angel, with tales of his past lives as Euric, a petty thief in 11th-century Seville; an Incan princess; an assistant to Lewis and Clark during their expedition; Oscar Wilde's housecat, and more. ("I'd lived a full life—seven full lives!") The facility's mental-health staff is skeptical, naturally, but Eugene's storytelling skills are top-notch, and Angel is particularly enchanted with Eugene's long-ago romance with Gaya, who saved him from the Moors' clutches and may have been reincarnated as a woman he knew in 1940s Los Angeles. As Eugene's stories pile up—and as he assists Angel with his own romantic struggles some cracks in the unreliable narrator's facade begin to emerge. But Evison is concerned less with the factual accuracy of Eugene's experience than he is with how stories (even far-fetched ones) inspire empathy, and that togetherness, driven "purely by the desire to connect, is more meaningful than just about anything else." It's a sweet, borderline saccharine notion, and the novel is often nakedly sentimental when it isn't organizationally ungainly; Euric's tale dominates the past lives, with the others adding relatively little to the narrative. In prior novels like The Revised Fundamentals of Caregiving (2012) and This Is Your Life, Harriet Chance! (2015), Evison demonstrated deep compassion toward hard-luck cases, the elderly, and the unwell. That's just as true here; true or not, Eugene's efforts to slay his past demons is affecting. But that plotline is subsumed by some cloying prose.

<u>ADULT NON FICTION:</u> REASONS NOT TO WORRY: HOW TO BE STOIC IN CHAOTIC TIMES by Brigid Delaney Genres; Nonfiction, Philosophy, Self Help, Psychology

In this heartfelt and soul-searching work, brimming with warmth, humor, and insight, the beloved Guardian columnist spends a year exploring how to pursue a rich and meaningful life, turning to the wisdom of the Stoics for insights into the deepest questions of existence.

Like many people today, Brigid Delaney was searching for answers to timeless questions: How can we be good? Find inner peace? Properly grieve? Tame our insecurities, such as the fear of missing out? Determine what truly matters?


Centuries ago, the Stoics pondered many of these same questions. And so, at an important inflection point in her own life, Brigid decided to let these ancient philosophers be her guide. Brigid is rash where the Stoics are logical; she runs on chaos, while the Stoics relinquish control of things beyond their reach. Over the course of a year, she dedicated herself to following the wisdom of Seneca, Epictetus, and Marcus Aurelius. She hoped to discover how best to live--how she could use the wisdom of these ancient thinkers to navigate life in the modern world.

In Reasons Not to Worry, Brigid shares what she learned, showing us how we, too, can draw on the Stoics to regain a sense of agency and tranquility and find meaning in our lives. From learning to relinquish control to cultivating daily awareness of our mortality to building community, Brigid's insights are very funny and very wise.

Stoicism can be a tough medicine to swallow, but no longer. Thoughtful, timely, surprisingly practical, and filled to the brim with ways to learn how best to be in the world, Delaney's guide provides compelling and sensible reasons not to worry.








Library system formally
began in 1939, when

Roosevelt donated his
personal and
Presidential papers to
the Federal Government.
At the same time,
Roosevelt pledged part



of his estate at Hyde Park to the United States, and friends of the President formed a non-profit corporation to raise funds for the construction of the library and museum building. Roosevelt's decision stemmed from a firm belief that Presidential papers are an important part of the national heritage and should be accessible to the public. He asked the National Archives to take custody of his papers and other historical materials and to administer his library. Now you know! Congratulations to Gunner who won a set of drinking glasses just in time for holiday celebrations.

Interesting Holiday Trivia

Real Christmas trees are better for the environment than artificial ones. This is for a number of reasons, from the toxic materials fake trees are made of to the fact that Christmas tree farms serve as a habitat for local wildlife. Christmas trees have been sold in the U.S. since 1850. There are two competing claims as to which president was the first to place a Christmas tree in the White House. Some scholars say President Franklin Pierce did in 1856; others say President Benjamin Harrison brought in the first tree in 1889. President Coolidge started the White House lighting ceremony in 1923. President Teddy Roosevelt, an environmentalist, banned Christmas trees from the White House in 1901. Norway sends a Christmas tree to Britain every year as a symbol of gratitude for their help preserving Norwegian liberty during World War II.

The total number of gifts listed in "The 12 Days of Christmas" is 364 — nearly one gift for every day in the year. Someone did the math, and in case you're wondering: Partridges: $1 \times 12 = 12$; Doves: $2 \times 11 = 22$; Hens $3 \times 10 = 30$; Calling birds: $4 \times 9 = 36$; Golden rings: $5 \times 8 = 40$; Geese: $6 \times 7 = 42$; Swans: $7 \times 6 = 42$; Maids: $8 \times 5 = 40$; Ladies: $9 \times 4 = 36$; Lords: $10 \times 3 = 30$; Pipers: $11 \times 2 = 22$; Drummers: $12 \times 1 = 12$ for a total of 364.

The movie *It's a Wonderful Life* performed very poorly at the box office when it was first released. The film didn't become a classic until years later, when Republic Pictures failed to extend their copyright and it became available in the public domain.

Assuming Rudolph was in front, there are 40,320 ways to rearrange the other reindeer. (*I personally will never question the validity of this trivia due to being severely mathematically challenged but you can feel free to fact check this!*)
"Jingle Bells" was also the very first song heard from space when astronauts Wally Schirra and Thomas Stafford played it in a message to Earth on December 16, 1965!

After doing the math, Santa "expert" Larry Silverberg theorized that Santa Claus would take five Earth minutes to distribute all his presents, provided he was traveling at the speed of light, getting help from his elves, and making use of "relativity clouds," which would allow him to "stretch time like a rubber band." (*Ok*, there will be no questions or answers coming concerning this statement either. I said it was trivia not fact!)
